# Independents at the People's Convergence Conference

Jackie Salit appeared with Dr. Jill Stein, former Green Party presidential candidate, on a panel on "Progressive Prospects in 2018 and 2020" at the People's Convergence Conference held over the weekend at American University's School of Law in Washington, D.C.

Over 200 people attended the conference organized by the Draft Bernie for a People's Party, the Progressive Independent Party and Socialist Alternative, in order to discuss a path forward and "extend an i nvitation to Bernie Sanders to join a discussion about the future of the progressive movement and the country." Prior to the conference, 50,000 "Draft Bernie" signatures were delivered to his office. Sanders did not accept an invitation to attend the conference.



Joining Salit and Stein on the panel were Charles Douglas (People's Party of North Carolina), Peter Joseph (Zeitgeist Institute), Nick Brana (Draft Bernie for a People's

Party) and Araquel Bloss (Progressive Independent Party). Brian Jones of the Justice Party moderated.

Salit spoke about the history of the Reform Party and the unique left/center/right coalition that led to its founding.

"We found that you actually could bring Americans together across ideological, class, race, geographic, and generational lines by focusing on the issue of process and power and being willing to backburner a set of issues that were close to everyone's heart in favor of using process, structural reform, and restoration of a true democratic process. I continue to hold to the belief that that is an important tool that we have as progressives to build with."

Salit continued, " The American people are saying 'we need to change the power structure in this country.' We, I believe, as progressives, have a responsibility to give to them and create for them what they are asking for."

## Sign the Petition to Support Open Primaries in Florida

A petition to urge Florida's Constitution Revision Commission (CRC) to put an open primaries measure on the 2018 ballot is being spearheaded by Florida Fair and and Open Primaries (FFAOP), the organization which represents independent voters in Florida.

With support from Open Primaries, Independent Voting and Tim Canova's Progress for All, signatures are being collected by activists and online. September 22 is the deadline for

submitting a formal proposal to the CRC, and organizers expect to submit thousands of signatures along with the proposal.

"We have made great progress thus far," said Steve Hough, spokesperson for FFAOP and leader of the drive. "Our network is growing, and we continue to generate interest and support. Andrew Huston's letter to the editor was just published in the Gainesville Sun. We have also been contacted by a person running for Palm Beach County Commission who is supporting our effort. as well as an NPA [No Party Affiliation] attempting to qualify for the governor's race. Generating this type of support with the political class is a big deal. Tim Canova's organization (Progress for All) has been a huge help."
