Over 3,000 independents from 50 states (and the District of Columbia) have taken the survey to date and we have 35 days to reach our 5,000 survey goal.



Florida Fair and Open Primaries (FFAOP) Launches Petition Drive to Open the Primaries

In March 2017, **Steve Hough** assumed the leadership of the grassroots organization **Florida Fair and Open Primaries** (FFAOP). The organization was created as an affiliate of Independent Voting by **Duane Pike** of Tampa, Florida in 2012 under another name, but the mission was always to advocate for Florida's adoption of a Top-Two open primary. When Steve was introduced to **John Opdycke**, president of **Open Primaries**, at Independent Voting 's national conference in New York City in 2016, they decided to team up on this effort.

Back in sunny Florida, the state's Constitution Revision Commission (CRC) was being convened. The CRC is unique to Florida and is convened every twenty years. It provides the opportunity for citizens to appear before a commission and has the power to place proposed constitutional amendments directly on the ballot.

John and Steve agreed that the commission process would be an ideal vehicle for advancing the cause for open primaries in Florida, thus setting into motion a year-long campaign to lobby the CRC to put an open primaries amendment before the voters so the voters could decide.

Steve told the story of that campaign for the *Independent Voter Network* in, " Florida Legislature, Partisan Appointees Prevent Equal Voting Rights for All. "

Now, Florida Fair and Open Primaries has launched two petitions for ballot initiatives to open the primaries to all voters in the state. Currently under Florida's closed system, voters must join a political party to vote in the primaries. One of the petitions seeks a Top-Two open primary and the second demands an end to public funding and support for private (closed) party primaries.

Currently, over 3.4 million independent Florida voters - 27% of all registered voters in the state - are barred from voting in primary elections that they pay for with their tax dollars. They will once again be disenfranchised from upcoming primary elections on August 28. For many Florida voters, the primary election is the only election that matters, because in 2016 a mere 16% of general election races in the state were considered competitive.

Said Hough: "We believe voters should have been afforded the opportunity to determine the fate of an open primaries amendment. Despite the failure of the CRC to forward an open primaries amendment to this year's ballot, voters may have an opportunity to decide in the future. We are currently engaged in a citizens' initiative to place an amendment on the 2020 ballot. At issue is whether Florida citizens believe the

fundamental right to vote should be extended to all registered voters in every election. As the vast majority of races are decided in a primary election, by a tiny fraction of the electorate, we believe they will agree."

Tom Cullen, Director of Outreach, Florida Fair and Open Primaries, Inc. added: "There has been a growing sense among voters in Florida and across the country that no one is really listening. Well, we're standing up and making the political establishment listen. Florida voters are tired of paying millions of dollars for primary elections that exclude over a quarter of our fellow citizens. We're inviting every Floridian to join us in putting an open primaries referendum on the 2020 ballot. Let the voters decide!"

Western Colorado Independents Plan Next Steps

On July 12. the Western Colorado Independent Voters (WCIV) met at the Glenwood Springs

Library for their monthly meeting. The primary topic of discussion was analyzing the independent voter turn-out at Colorado's first semi-open primary on June 26. Out of over 12,000 ballots mailed to independents in Garfield County, only 2800 ballots were returned. This was typical of other counties in Western Colorado. While the voter turn-out overall was 31%, the turn-out for independents was 20%. Out of 1.5 million registered independent voters in Colorado, only 291,000 voted. The most votes cast by independents were in the metro-Denver area, which is highly populated.

Among the questions raised at the WCIV meeting were: Were independents making a statement by not voting, signaling that there was virtually no

change to the undemocratic election process? Are they frustrated by having to vote for Democrat or Republican parties in every election? Are they fed-up with taxpayers funding primary elections for Democratic and Republican parties in every election? There were many more probing questions raised as well.

Having analyzed that the new semi-open primary was a temporary fix or non-fix for independents and third parties, **Randy Fricke** led a discussion on possible ballot initiatives in 2020. He pointed out that California, Maine, and Washington have all replaced partisan primaries with either top-two primaries or ranked-choice primaries - both of which are more democratric than closed partisan primaries. Since many people were unfamiliar with these election alternatives, it was agreed that Randy would bring more detailed information to WCIV's next meeting on Wednesday, August 15, at 7 PM at the Glenwood Springs Library. Fricke indicated that WCIV could be the first

independent voter group to propose a new, more democratic election system in Colorado. Members also completed the independent voter survey, **9 Questions for the 44%**, at the meeting.
